Good day all!

First a big thank you to all who helped with Caritas at St John. It was a wonderful time to serve God in the poor and we certainly obeyed His command. We could have used more volunteers, but I am especially grateful to those who put in the extra effort to cover the days and nights when we needed additional volunteers. You know who you are. And so does God!!! Good work and thank you!!!!!

Now, I want to alert you to one of the most beautiful, powerful and prophetic scripture passages in the Bible. I absolutely love this account. It is from 2 Maccabees 7. It was the first reading this morning.

But the reading you heard was edited for brevity. And you missed all the good stuff. So get your Bible and read chapter 7 of 2 Maccabees. It's amazing.

It's about a mother with seven sons. They are being tortured by a pagan king to give up their religious beliefs. He is an awful and cruel king. This is what he does.

He takes the first one and tortures him in front of the other 6 brothers and the mom. He scalps him, cuts off his tongue, hands and feet while the rest of the brothers and mother watch. Then he burns him alive in front of them.

The rest of them, looking at this horrible act committed against their family member, encouraged each other to remain faithful saying "the Lord God is looking on and truly has compassion on us."

Then they brought in the second brother. They gave him an ultimatum to deny his religious beliefs. He refused and so they tore off his skin and hair. The others looked on and said to the pagan king "you accursed fiend, you are depriving us of the present life but the King of the universe will raise us up."

They grabbed the third brother and did likewise. He immediately stretched out his hands and said "It was from Heaven that I received these; for the sake of his laws I disregard them; from him I hope to receive them again."

The king started to be amazing at their courage and spirit. Similarly number 4, 5 and 6 were tortured. Then it really gets intense.

They brought in number 7. The king was going nuts. He couldn't understand why these people wouldn't just simply deny their faith. To the 7th, he promised to make him rich and happy if he would just "abandon his ancestral customs." He even talked to the mother, who had just watched her 6 sons tortured and is now watching her last one have to make the choice. After much urging, the mom said she would talk with her son. The king thought she was going to talk her son into accepting the bribe. No chance. She leaned over to the son and said this: "Do not be afraid of this executioner, but be worthy of your brothers and accept death, so that in the time of mercy I may receive you again with your brothers."

Then it says, she had "scarcely finished speaking when the youth said: 'What is the delay? I will not obey the king's command. I obey the command of the law given to our ancestors"

The last son said to the king, "you...will not escape the hands of God... you, by the judgment of God, shall receive just punishments for your arrogance."

The king put him to death. As well as the mother.

I am amazed at many things by this account. First and obviously, their courage and persevering faith. Would I be so courageous if someone were forcing me to deny the tenants of our faith...the belief in the Real Presence in the Eucharist, the Churches teaching on life, the Churches teaching on marriage, etc? I hope so...

Secondly, I am amazed even more by the mother. How intense a mother's love is for her children, yet she allows them and encourages them to suffer for what is right. She is a mom who sees the value in struggle, difficulty and suffering and doesn't seek at all costs to shelter her kids from it.

Suffering helps us merit Heaven.

It's amazing account. Much to be learned from reflecting upon it.

VIRGINIA CATHOLIC CONFERENCE

Bishops DiLorenzo and Loverde urge voters to form consciences, pray & let Catholic social principles guide them in voting booth & beyond

With less than three weeks before Americans go to the polls to elect the next president and members of Congress, Bishop Francis DiLorenzo of Richmond and Bishop Paul Loverde of Arlington have issued a pre-election statement to guide Virginia Catholics before going into the voting booth on Nov. $8^{\rm th}$.

They call on Catholics to carefully form their consciences, pray, learn the issues, consider candidates' character and use principles of Catholic social teaching to guide them. Voters should apply the Golden Rule to their decisions in the public sphere, the bishops say. See their statement in English_and in Spanish.

The bishops urge voters to re-engage in the political system -- "even when the political discourse around us is uncivil" -- and quote Pope Francis, who in his 2015 visit to the United States urged public officials and voters alike to "treat others with the same passion and compassion with which we want to be treated."

Four principles of Catholic social teaching light the way: Preserving the inherent dignity of every human person; striving to satisfy the common good; and incorporating the principles of subsidiarity and solidarity.

In addition, the bishops clarify two ideas that are being discussed during this election season: the falsehood that one can be personally opposed to abortion, but support it in the public square, and the incorrect notion that the Church's teaching on marriage as the union of one man and one woman could change.
